



21 November is the feast of the Entry of the Mother of God into the Temple, when she was a small child.

The story is not told in the Holy Scriptures, but in some very ancient writings, and has been believed in from the earliest times.

The birth of Mary was the answer to the prayer of her parents Righteous Joachim and Anna were elderly and until then childless.

They in thankfulness to God for his mercy, dedicated Mary to God.

At the age of two they discussed the matter but decided that she was too little to be parted from them. But when she was three they said the time was right.

They took her to Jerusalem and were delighted when the little child ran to the priest who welcomed her, never once hesitating or looking back, but eagerly pressing forward to be welcomed by a group of girls, who also welcomed and took care of her.

Mary spent her youth at the Temple, getting to know the Holy Scriptures and working on the vestments and hangings for the Temple and its clergy.

At about the age of sixteen Mary was betrothed to Joseph, a widowed man with children, and the rest of the story is well-known to us all.


### Retirement after long service as our Parish Treasurer

### Our Parish Patron

St Martin is our principal Patron—followed of course by St Helen. Everybody knws the story of his cutting his soldier's uniform cloak in two, ut there is much more to him than that. He was bishop at the city of Tours in Gaul (modern-day France) in the fourth century, but lived a very humble life. He was loved by the people of Gaul, but also wielded great influence wit the kings. We celebrate his repose on Friday 11 November, with the Holy Liturgy at 9.30 am in St Martin's.

### A Word from the Fathers: about St Martin of Tours

I artin knew beforehand the day on which he would die, and he warned the brethren that his dissolution was approaching fast. Then there arose the eed for him to go to the diocese of Candes where dissensions had broken out among the clergy. His desire to restore peace would not permit him to find an excuse in the death he knew was so near, and he made his way to Candes. It seemed to him that it would be a fitting consummation of all his labours if he could leave the church a legacy of peace. After a brief sojourn in that village, or

church rather, he succeeded in his mission an now meant to to return to his monastery but his bodily powers failed suddenly. He called the brethren to his death-bed and told them he was dying. Great sorrow gripped his hearers, and there was only one cry in the midst of all their tears: father, why are you deserting us? To whose care are you leaving us in our grief?...Martin was greatly moved by their tears, which stirred the life-long sympathy in him that flowed from the heart of God's mercy...Martin who was poor and humble, enters heaven wealthy.
