

The Feast of the Nativity of our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ, as Christmas is known in the eastern church, has always held a place of great importance in the liturgical life of the Orthodox Church. Its origin goes back to the time of the Apostles. In the Apostolic Constitutions (Section 3, 13) it says, "Brethren, observe the feast days; and first of all the Birth of Christ..." In another place it also says, "Celebrate the day of the Nativity of Christ, on which unseen grace is given man by the birth of the Word of God from the Virgin Mary for the salvation of the world." It was jointly celebrated with the feast of Theophany in earlier times as Christ's baptism was seen as the first, glorious manifestation of His divinity. At any rate, Christmas has assumed greater prominence in the West over the centuries and despite the later onslaught of commercialism, sentimental nonsense, parties and material excess, the great feast's revelation of the arrival of the God-Man Jesus Christ; God incarnate, coming to live among us, to save us from the slavery of sin and death, has not been entirely lost, even in a somewhat indifferent culture. Let us Orthodox Christians therefore, give thanks this Christmas for the arrival of our King and our God and the bountiful gifts which He has bestowed upon us and our blessed community. Father Alexander and Khouria Hilary, Khouria Paula and I wish you all a blessed and happy Christmas. Christ is born! Glorify Him!

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Heat and Light! After three bitter winters since making our new home in St Martin's we finally have our heaters and chandeliers. The whole of the church is now pleasantly warmed by our radiant heating units which can be turned on separately or all at once and varied in output. The remaining icons are 8 of the 12 feasts which will be placed across the top row of the iconostasis. Christmas Morning: After the liturgy on Christmas Morning, please join us to sing a few Christmas carols from different national traditions



St Nicholas the Wonder Worker, Archbishop of Myra in Lycia.

By tradition, Nicholas was born in the province of Lycia during the Third Century in the southern part of Asia Minor in the city of Patara to well-to-do parents. Having inherited his parents' estate, he became known for his generous gifts to those in need. As a youth, he made pilgrimages to Palestine and Egypt. He was subsequently consecrated Archbishop of Myra as the fourth century began. He was imprisoned during the persecutions of Diocletian and released by Constantine after his ascension to emperor. Nicholas was noted for his defense of Orthodoxy against the Arians. He is reputed to have been present at the Council of Nicea, but his name does not appear among any documents from that era. He died in Myra on December 6 in a year uncertain, but between 342 and 352.

After St Methodius' life of Nicholas became available in the Ninth Century, Nicholas was acclaimed and honored throughout Europe and especially in Italy. When Myra was captured by the Saracens in 1034, many Italian cities planned to "rescue" his relics. In 1087, forces from Bari, Italy, attacked Myra and carried away his relics from the lawful Greek guardians in Myra to Bari where they were enshrined in a new church. His fame increased. The story of his rescue of sailors in the Aegean Sea during his lifetime established him as the patron of mariners. His popularity in Russia rose to the point that almost all churches had some sort of shrine honoring St. Nicholas.
