# The Holy Cross of Christ shows how our God loves us

There are many theories as to what the Crucifixion of Christ means. Some theories are in themselves rather barbarous, unworthy of the Christians who conceived or articulated them.

Others are far better, but somehow come at the question - why God allows his own Son to be murdered so brutally - from the wrong angle.

Surely, what the Cross does is to show the love of God for us. God himself, who has entered our world and our flesh in Jesus Christ, gives himself into our hands for us to do what we will - and what we do is crucify him.

It shows that God the All-seeing One, loves us completely and without reservation.

"God loves me."

Now that is something to get excited about! -The Creator of all, 'He Who is', the Almighty death, as we say over and over again in One, the One beyond understanding, beyond the Orthodox Liturgy. He rises again in glory, knowing, loves me, knows me, cares for me, a glory that already shines forth in the dies for me - that is Good News indeed!

That is what the Cross certainly does show us - me personally, if I am willing to accept it.



BETTY CROWE was a good friend to our church, living in the bungalow opposite St Helen's. Though pretty well confined to her home, especially in more recent years, she would keep an eye on the building and report anything untoward. Her great help was that when we received the wonderful gift of the Relic of St Helen from His Grace Bishop BASIL of Wichita. We did not immediately place it in the church, but took it to Betty's house overnight where she looked after it. Next day, in the presence of His Worship the Mayor, Councillor Dr CHRIS HALL, we went over to Betty's to collect it and then carried it in solemn procession to St Helen's. - Sadly, Betty died recently in hospital, after years of suffering and ill-health, from which she is well delivered. I have remembered her at the Holy Altar as a benefactor of this church.

JULIA SEALEY of Maidenburgh Street has also been a friend of St Helen's. She and her husband Dr PAUL presented us with an icon from Crete, which they loved to visit. She had cancer a few years ago and sadly it returned. She faced up to it bravely and openly, and died the day before Betty. Her funeral was a memorable one, with her horsedrawn hearse proceeding down the High Street. Paul is at the Museum Department and Julia also worked for the Council.

We shall miss our two neighbours, Betty and Julia, and assure those who mourn them of our care and concern. Memory eternal!

### Meet vour local Saints

A series on the Orthodox Saints of the Colchester area

#### 4. St Dunstan

St Dunstan was Bishop of London - and so our Bishop here - for only one year, 959-960. Then he was made Archbishop of Canterbury - and so 'our' Archbishop - and such he remained for 27 years. He was the greatest Archbishop of the ninth century, and wielded a great influence in the country, being chief adviser to the King, Edgar. He crowned him in Bath Abbey in 973, and was not afraid to rebuke him for his sins. He supported the next king, young Edward, who was treacherously killed and is venerated as a Martyr.

He came from a family close to royalty, born at Baltonsborough near Glastonbury in Somerset, at which Monastery he was educated and later became Abbot. At times he lived as a hermit.

There is little doubt that he would have visited at least some of his churches and Monasteries in Essex, being so near his Cathedral of St Paul.

He restored Holy Monasteries destroyed by the Danes, including Barking, and reformed others, introducing the Benedictine Rule widely. Having rebuked and reformed King Edgar, he reformed and tightened up the discipline of the whole Church in England.

He died in 988, and was buried in Canterbury cathedral. Feast-day: 19 May.

### Here and There

WOMEN'S WORLD DAY OF PRAYER: Women are invited to this annual ecumenical occasion, this year on Friday 5 March in St James' Church, East Hill at 10.15 am.

MANNINGTREE CHURCHES have invited me to speak to them, in their Lent series, on Wednesday 10 March about the Orthodox faith.

CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING: The first ordinary meeting of the new Council will be on Sunday 7 March at 1.00 pm.

CHURCHES TOGETHER: This body in Central Colchester brings together the clergy and lay representatives from the various churches. We are an 'Observer' member, and our lay rep is MARY MORRIS. There are now two other bodies which cover some of the same ground as CTCC: these are 'Seeking God's Blessing for Colchester' and 'Hope'. Most of the churches are represented on them, though not St Helen's. At its AGM recently the CTCC agreed that it was not at the moment really fulfilling much of a purpose and has decided not to meet for one year, until the AGM in 2011, and possibly then not again until the following year. This gives members of CTCC time to rethink its position and purpose. The clergy will continue to meet regularly in the Fraternal, so there will still be contact between the churches.

IONA is a most beautiful island on the west coast of Scotland where, for many, heaven comes down to earth. It has ever been so, at least since St Columba settled there in the sixth century and made it not only beautiful but holy. Reader IGNATIUS BACON, who lives in Fort William, and others, have the vision of (in time) an Orthodox Monastery there. In the meanwhile, with the blessing of Metropolitan KALLISTOS, he has arranged for anybody to stay in a cottage there for a life of Orthodox prayer any time this 31 March-28 April, repeating an experiment that he successfully tried last year. I have visited Iona on several occasions, and have actually stayed on the island for a few days a couple of times. It is well worth it, if you can make it.
