

have always loved Ascension Day, one of the Twelve Great Feasts of the year. When I was a church choirboy in Harrow in the north-west suburbs of London, on this day we had to get to church early before the 6.30 am Eucharist: we choir men and boys would first climb the church tower and from its summit would sing the rousing Ascension hymn, Hail the day... (see box). It was done really just for the glory of doing it, and of course at the end of each line we sang out an Alleluia with even greater force.

When we moved to Devon I was again a choir boy. There was no tower to the church, so we did not celebrate Ascension that way. The choir stalls faced each other, but we did turn to the east to recite the Creed, and there, spread out above us, was the Victorian stained glass of the east window, a great 'icon' of the Ascension. It simultaneously judged and loved us. Half a century later, long removed from it, in my mind's eye I see it still, and experience now the senses that came upon me through the years of standing beneath it, as choir boy and then server, for the Creed, and how powerful it really became on Ascension Day.

Examine the words of Hail the day ... and the other much-loved English Ascension hymns, and you will find they are orthodox. They speak of the glory of God, of his magnificence, and yet also of his care for all mankind and especially for those who keep faith in him.

Even now I tremble at the wonderful words of this and others of those hymns, and pray that one day - perhaps far in the distant future - we Orthodox in these western lands will learn how to absorb into our tradition some of the enormous treasures that western Christianity has preserved or developed within itself. Sometimes their orthodoxy may be encased deep within other less orthodox things. But I certainly hope to be singing those Ascension hymns on Ascension Day in heaven (if God is merciful)!

They speak of the glory of the kingdom of heaven. They speak of the end of suffering, and the joy of bliss. They tell us that the reward of Christ's Passion and Death is not only Resurrection in this life, but also bliss in the world to come - for him, and for us also who follow in his way - I go to prepare a place for you, he said.

The Ascension is the ultimate reply of God to our complaint about the difficulties of our life, the sorrows of our earthly existence, the temptations to give up, to turn backwards, to think it was all better in the past, easier then to live the Christian life, to follow the Master. It guards us against the temptation (yes, the temptation!) to see all our hope in the terms of past events - great, essential, vital, as they are - of the Lord's Incarnation, of his ministry or teaching or Death or even his Resurrection.

The Ascension teaches us indeed to base ourselves upon those holy and pure truths, but to look forward and upward. To be positive about the direction of this world's fate, to see not only God's hand in past history, but also God's future for this world and us.

The Gospel shows that the future, eternity, is God's, and his alone. In looking to him and his purpose for mankind, for the world, we find hope.

God bless you, dear Friends, as you look to the glory of God in the future, towards his mercies, his rewards, and his blessings.

The new icon of the Saints of Barking by Dimitri Hak was blessed and gifts made towards its cost (contributions are still invited). The programme was the same as last year's, except that there were also short prayers before the carvedstone Holy Rood of Barking in the first-floor Gatehouse Chapel. It probably dates from Saxon (Orthodox) times. Though defaced at the Reformation, it is beautiful, and said to have been miraculous. We had a small bus for the Colchester Pilgrims. Other Pilgrims came from Billericay, Southend, and various parts of London and district, including Fr Alexander Tefft and several from his parish in the City.
