Orthodoxy in Basildon: one year old!

n 23 October, the feast of St James the Brother of the Lord, the Orthodox Mission to Basildon celebrates its first anniversary.

Our beloved community, which has grown steadily over the past twelve months, includes people from Britain, Cyprus, Greece, and Romania, with our ages ranging from under-one year to ninety years old.

We are blessed to have amongst us cradle Orthodox, native converts, catechumens and pilgrims on their way to the Holy Church, even young men interested in the Priesthood.

Recently we received a donation of a beautiful hand-painted icon of Christ.

Our hope is to move beyond once-monthly Divine Liturgy, commencing with (Reader-led) mid-monthly services in the near future.

Longer term, we pray for a church of our own, full-time clergy, Sunday Liturgies and a full calendar of services.

We remain deeply indebted to Fr Alexander, the Church Council and people of St Helen's - and to the Catholic community in Basildon, for their goodwill, generosity and support.

Please pray for us as we reach out to the people of South Essex that God's will may be done.

We have **St** Helen's until 2016

Recently I signed the renewal of our sub-lease of St Helen's from the Colchester Borough Council. So our future at the Chapel is assured until 28 September 2016.

For those who are new to our church, let me explain the set-up. At the Reformation, in 1539, the ancient St Helen's Chapel was sold and secularised, used as a house, meeting-house, school, etc, though awareness of its holiness remained in the community.

In 1886 the owner restored it and gave it to the local Anglican diocese, but it was not re-consecrated for worship. In, I think, the 1960s the Anglicans leased it to the Borough Council, who used it as an office and then museum store-room. Only in 2000 did it again become a place of worship—for the Orthodox community. We have had it on short sub-leases ever since.

The main lease to the Council runs out in 2016, and that is why our sub-lease does too. We do not know what will then happen to us or the Chapel. It is possible that the same arrangement will continue, or we might ask the Anglicans to give us a direct lease, or even to take over ownership.

We certainly hope that it will remain an Orthodox church—but the final decision will not be in our hands. It will all have to be discussed in the coming years.

In several respects as a building it is not entirely satisfactory for us, and of course we have long (oh, so long!) been asking to use nearby St Martin's Church, which would well suit our needs, but that story is not yet completed.

Meanwhile we shall certainly continue to enjoy use of the historic,

interesting and (above all) *holy* St Helen's Chapel - according to ancient tradition built by St Helen herself for her prayers, and where she would also have brought her young son St Constantine.

May the prayers of those two great Saints guard and protect this building and maintain it for centuries ahead for the pure worship of Holy Orthodoxy.

Anglicans and Albania

I have just been all the way to Albania to meet Anglicans!

Not that there can be many Anglicans living in Albania: it was for this year's session of the official *International Dialogues* between Orthodoxy and Anglicanism, where I had the privilege of representing the Patriarchate of Antioch.

Having looked at difficult and sometimes divisive questions in the past, we are now examining so-called Christian anthropology—which in this context means, What do Christians believe

about the nature of being a human being? Or, as we might put it, What is Man?

The subject is of vital importance in the modern world, since our answer to the question will affect many practical matters like human rights, ecology, imprisonment, and bio-ethics.

This year we were the guests of the Albanian Orthodox Church. This Church - like all other religions - was brutally (and supposedly totally) suppressed under the dictator Hoxha. No expression of any religion at all was permitted in public or private life.

But after the fall of communism about 1990 the Church was able to re-establish herself, and the story of that has been extraordinary. It has been led by His Beatitude Archbishop Anastasius, remarkably a Greek, yet enjoying wide

respect in that mainly Muslim country. Relations with Muslims are good.

He has been able to achieve a huge amount - rebuilding churches, establishing schools, clinics, etc and a university. More especially he has rebuilt the Orthodox Christian community there, and it now seems very active and lively.

We stayed in the seminary or theological academy for training clergy and lay people: it has trained over 400 Priests now serving their Church and country. It has lovely premises and was very hospitable.

At its heart, on top of a hill, is the church of St Vlash, the focal point and the main Saint for Albanian Christianity: it was totally destroyed by the communists.

We had fruitful discussion about many basic subjects, and hope in our next session to begin to consider the practical outcome of our common thinking—and it did prove 'common thinking', because there was little disagreement between Anglican and Orthodox on these subjects.

It will be interesting to see how far there

can be agreement in future sessions on practical questions. It is important to remember that in spite of all the important disagreement we have with Anglicans on very great issues, there are yet vast areas of theological thinking where we are in agreement.

On the Sunday of the conference we went to the old restored Cathedral in Tirana. Metropolitan Kallistos (Orthodox Chairman) presided, with Bishops and Priests, including me, concelebrating.

Then we visited the brand-new, not-yetin-use Cathedral, and a Church-funded clinic with the very latest equipment, serving people of all faiths. We also visited the national museum, and the old

city of Kruje, where we saw the museum in honour of Scanderbeg, a great 15th century Albanian hero.

Our discussions did prove tiring, but their atmosphere was good, and the warmth of welcome by the Albanian Orthodox Church was great.

So it was a lovely and fruitful week in a land and Church come to life again, resurrected, after so terrible a period under the communists. God bless Albania!
