

Praying at English holy places

In January Khouria Hilary and I visited Oxford, partly for my spiritual well-being, partly to stay with old family friends, and partly to visit an exhibition at the famous Ashmolean Museum of the artistic work of William Blake, a celebrated 18/19th century English artist. We had a pleasant three-night break.

We stayed with our friends in a village near Oxford, and en route went to Binsey, within the city ring road but amazingly in remote countryside. Both the university and city of Oxford grew out of the women's monastery founded in the 7th century by St Frideswide (icon 1) on the site of the present Christ Church Cathedral and College. The Saint had a bolt-hole at Binsey and there is a holy well, from which Hilary was able to get down to get us a little drink.

While in Oxford we had lunch with our friends at the Eagle and Child pub in St Giles. This also was something of a pilgrimage, because of the writer CS Lewis. He was an Anglican, greatly respected by large numbers of Orthodox, not only as a children's writer (The Lion, the Witch &c) but also as a theologian and philosopher. He and JRR Tolkien (The Hobbits &c) and other friends met there, and nicknamed it The Bird and the Baby. It is certainly a place of literary and religious interest.

On our return journey we visited the city of St Albans, just outside the M25 round London. There of course we prayed at the tomb of St Alban (3rd or 4th century) the first British Martyr (icon 4). I have been there several times over the years, sometimes for the Orthodox Liturgy in the fine Abbey. But this time we also visited the ruined Roman city down the hill from the Abbey called Verulamium, which I last visited as a boy nearly 70 years ago.

Then, also just outside the M25 at Hertford we visited the sculpture of St Theodore (icon 3), the Greek from Tarsus in the Church of Antioch who became Archbishop of Canterbury in the 7th century and put the then-Orthodox Church in England in order. The sculpture commemorates the Holy Synod he convened at Hertford. He is Patron of our Archdiocese.


+ + + In February, Hilary and I made a further foray, this time to Alex and Ela near Portsmouth. On the way there we visited Chertsey for the first time. This squeezes between the M25 and the M3. Here St Erkenwald (icon 2) established his men's monastery close to the River Thames in the mid-7th century. After that he founded Barking Abbey for his sister St Ethelburga, and later became Bishop of London.

here are many holy places from Orthodox L times around England. Thankfully some of them are becoming more widely known again, after centuries of neglect.

The Orthodox can cooperate with Catholics and Anglicans in making these places better known and loved and more centres of prayer. Many have a genuine Orthodox 'feel', and while they are normally and sadly without any relics since the 16th century, they still retain a holy atmosphere. It should be noted however that there are relics of St Frideswide in Christ Church, Oxford, though sadly desecrated by mixture with other remains. And in St Albans Abbey in the past few years there has again been a relic of St Alban, given by a church in Germany that had preserved some.

What will greatly help to restore the prayerfulness of these places is Orthodox people precisely going to pray in them. Even without holv relics we can set up an icon and pray there, and find again the power of these holy men and women, which made them strong in the Lord, examples of the holy life for us, and our strong intercessors at the throne of God.

A Word from the Fathers: St Leo the Great, Pope of Rome (+461)

I t is certain that the poor more easily achieve the blessing of humility than the rich. Gentleness goes with poverty, pride more commonly with riches.

And yet, very many rich people do use their wealth for works of charity rather than as a means to puff their pride.

This spirit counts as among its greatest profits what it spends in relieving distress and hardship in others. In this virtue all classes and conditions of men meet, for they can share a common purpose while differing in wealth.

It does not matter how unequal they are in earthly possessions when they are seen to be equal in spiritual blessings.

Poverty is blessed, then, when it is not beguiled by a longing for earthly goods and does not seek increase of the world's riches, but desirers to be enriched with heavenly blessings.

Here and There

FELLOWSHIP OF ST ALBAN & ST SERGIUS: The meeting arranged for 3 March has been cancelled.

CLACTON: We continue to be grateful to the St James Anglican Church for their hospitality each month, and for their general goodwill. During Lent we shall be there on 21 March, and then on Bright Saturday, 18 April. Please note that, due to the change of date for the Barking Pilgrimage, the date for the Holy Liturgy in May has been changed to 23 May.

OUR NEW BISHOP: We are now pinning our hopes of receiving a new Metropolitan on the meeting of the Holy Synod due in June. We have not had a Bishop here since December 2012, when our Archbishop was taken from us and made Patriarch. It seems likely that we will have a Metropolitan from Lebanon or Syria - or there is an outside possibility it might be Englishman Fr PHILIP HALL from Lincoln Parish. For the present we are nominally under the direct pastoral care of HIS BEATITUDE PATRIARCH JOHN. Only when we do receive one or other sort of a Bishop for the Antiochian Diocese of the British Isles and Ireland can we in this country really become the Church that we are.

THE LENT SERVICES, Holy Pre-sanctified Liturgy and Akathist, are great helps towards extra prayerfulness during the Great Fast. Take advantage of them if you are free at those times. And you can also say extra prayers at home. These and other spiritual exercises help us prepare for Holy Week and Pascha.
