Where are we on church buildings?

hat question is very difficult to answer, even as I write at the very end of September! Here is a summary after a recent meeting.

Holy Trinity, by the Library

Anglicans still have an 'interest' in it: thankfully, both are happy for us to have it.

This would be on a lease (not to own, certainly at present), if we pay £4,000 pa into a 'sinking fund'. But this depends on nobody else making a bid for it better in some way. We must also install heating and divide up the one large interior in a suitable way. It is a high-grade listed building, but the response to our plans so far is very positive and hopeful. All this will cost a great deal and plans are being prepared.

• St Martin's, behind the Town Hall The Churches Conservation Trust, which, has been less then helpful over twenty years, has been helpful recently. Having agreed informally to buy it for £150,000 if we can raise that amount in an appeal we have now had suddenly to say that we would probably prefer Holy Trinity! Kindly they seem to accept our difficulty and are co-operative. But anyway they retain the fund-raising quite soon. right to sell it elsewhere for a good offer.

St Helen's, our home for 17 years

This is owned by the Borough but the It has been agreed with the Anglicans that we lease it for ten years at a rent of £2,000 pa, which could be increased after five years. The matter is with the lawyers, and will be signed when they are happy. We are not leaving here, and with a bigger church with no heating we shall use St Helen's in the winter at first.

· So where does all this leave us?

It means that we are going to have to hold ourselves in peace until before Christmas. If the Town Council decides we can have it, we could sign up with the high likelihood that we had the planning permission of both the Council and Heritage England.

All being well, we could be in Holy Trinity after matters are signed in the New Year, and can hope to worship there from next Holy Week and Pascha.

Lastly it means that all our Appeal planning has to be put on hold - my apologies to the Appeal Committee! Presumably we shall to have some sort of

St Osyth, local Holy Martyr

St Osyth lived in the 7th century, when the Church in the West was Orthodox. Devout daughter of a Mercian prince, she married the Christian King Sighere of Essex, and bore him a son, but it seems that when the king returned to paganism she left him and became a nun on royal land at the place Chich, now called St Osyth, on the coast near Clacton. In her Monastery she and her disciple-nuns led a holy life, but eventually a Danish party of pirates came up the Creek and attacked them, martyring the nuns. The story ran that Osvth picked up her head and carried it to the Monastery, which was where the parish church stands today - not where the later (mediaeval) Monastery stood until the Reformation, when her relics were lost. She died about 700. Feast: 7 October

Three Students keep in touch

VLAD GHITA (*Romania*) was with us only a short time in 2013, when he needed help and Christ stepped in and provided it. PETROS PETRIKKOS (*Cyprus*) served on the Holy Altar pretty well every Sunday, and other days too, in 2013-16. He has completed a year in law practice and hopes to work in legal translation work. He says, *I keep all of you in my thoughts. I will keep in touch*.

MATTHIAS (STEPHEN) HOYLE (*USA*) will not be known to you. He studied here only for one term, in 2016, and worshipped here only once. But he came to see me a number of times at the University and we got to know each other. Now he is finishing his degree at home, and writes: There are moments when I can still hear the sounds of the city and see the fog of incense rising above the congregation during my visit at your parish. My time in England touched me very deeply, and I have you to thank for making that experience spiritually enriching.
