

A quarter of a century of regular Orthodox worship in Colchester

This month we celebrate twenty-five years of regular Orthodox worship in Colchester. We are an established parish, an occasion worthy of notice.

In December 1995, with my having left the Anglican ministry in Bocking, next to Braintree, the Haig family were received into the Orthodox Church in St George's cathedral in London, and we moved to Colchester.

A few weeks later, in February 1996 we had a first service, Vespers, in St Paul's Church over near the station. Then on Saturday/Sunday 2/3 March we began regular worship there by the kindness of the Anglican vicar.

However, that summer the arrangement was suddenly abandoned because the building itself was declared to be in a dangerous condition. It was immediately closed and subsequently demolished.

But very quickly, by the grace of God and the goodwill of the local Co-op, we were allowed to begin regular worship in the Co-operative Funeral Chapel, then in Bourne Court off Mersea Road.

That arrangement continued for four years, and this parish must always consider the Cooperative Society one of its prime benefactors.

In 2000 the Co-op decided to redevelop the site, so we had to move out. Colchester Borough Council granted us a sub-lease of St Helen's Chapel, which of course delighted us, though the building was clearly too small to be an effective parish centre.

Our first Sunday in St Helen's was 19 November in 2000, a very joyful day. By the devotion of the people it was fitted with the furnishings of an Orthodox temple immediately.

And that of course brings us to 2020, when, after more than twenty years' struggle we were finally allowed to take on St Martin's—though even now in March 2021 completion is not yet accomplished.

On completion of the purchase we will become 'the Orthodox Parish of St Martin and St Helen'.

God be praised. May he keep us faithful.

THE ANNUNCIATION—when the Angel came to Holy Mary and said she was to be the Theotokos (God-bearer) - is celebrated on 25 March, exactly nine months of course before Holy Nativity, Christmas. It is frequently depicted in our temples on the holy gates or doors into the altar, to show that the Annunciation is the gate to the Christian way, the gateway to heaven. The Resurrection may be said to be the pivotal and central teaching of the Church, but the Annunciation may be said to be the basis of it all: it teaches that Christ is truly a full human being with all the characteristics of humanity except sin. And it says that Christ is also truly God - God, who takes human flesh to save us poor feeble sinners.

The Great Forty Days

The Great Fast (often known in English as Lent) is the 40 days from Clean Monday to the day before Lazarus Saturday. This ushers in the Great Week Fast and Holy Pascha.

The first Sunday is the Sunday of Orthodoxy, when we can bring a favourite Icon from home to carry in the procession after the Liturgy.

Lent 2 honours St Gregory Palamas.

Lent 3 has the Veneration of the Cross. Lent 4 honours St John Climacus ('of the Ladder').

Lent 6 honours St Mary of Egypt.

The Sunday themes help us to enter the spirit of the Great Fast, or which the first week is considered the one to be most strictly kept. Details of how we fast are shown in the Diocesan calendar (of which I have 2 spare copies now @ £4 each).

The fasting rules are slightly relaxed on Saturdays and Sundays. Do ask if you need other relaxations.
