The Entry of the Most Holy Theotokos into the Temple

The birth and early life of the Virgin Mary is not recorded in the Gospels or other books of the New Testament, the story is part of Holy Tradition and can be found in a work dating from the second century known as the Book of James or Protevangelion. Her parents, the Holy and Righteous Ancestors of God, Joachim and Anna fulfilled their promise to God and brought the child Mary to the temple; she was received with Joy by the High Priest Zacharias, who lifting her in his arms cried out: "It is in you that He has glorified your name in every generation. It is in you that He will reveal the Redemption that He has prepared for His people in the last days." Then, Zacharias brought Mary into the Holy of Holies—a place where only the High Priest was permitted to enter once a year on the Day of Atonement. He stood her on the steps of the altar, and the Grace of the Lord descended upon her. She arose and expressed her joy in a dance as wonder seized all who saw this happen. The Virgin Mary lived in the Temple for nine years until, reaching an age for marriage, she was taken from the Temple by the priests and elders and entrusted to Joseph as the guardian of her virginity. The story of Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple shows us her total dedication to God and her readiness for her future vocation as the Mother of the Incarnate Lord, the God Man Jesus. In the honor shown to Mary, we the faithful are summoned to look forward to the Incarnation of Christ, celebrated in just a few weeks by the Feast of the Nativity on December 25. Most Holy Theotokos save us!

ST MARTIN THE MERCIFUL BISHOP OF TOURS: NOVEMBER 11

In signs and in miracles, thou wast renowned throughout the land of Gaul, by grace thou art a light for the world. O Martin, bishop blessed of God; deeds of mercy and compassion filled thy life with their splendours - from the Troparion in Tone Four



St Martin was born in what is now modern day Hungary in around 316 but grew up in Italy. He was a soldier, after his father, in the Roman army. One night, near Amiens in France (then Gaul) as a yet to be baptised Christian catechumen he encountered a half naked beggar by the side of the road. Taking his sword, he cut his cloak in two and gave half to the poor man. Later that night Martin had a vision of Christ Himself who said to him: "Martin, while still a catechumen, has clothed me with this garment". Eventually, he was able to fulfill his long cherished hope of entering the monastic life and became a disciple of the great theologian and pastor St Hilary of Poitier. He was, rather against his will, made bishop of Tour on the Loire river but continued to live a simple monastic life attracting many new monks and inspiring a great monastic movement throughout France (of which he is patron) and Western Europe, including the British Isles; many churches throughout these lands were, and still are, dedicated to him. His steadfast preaching and guardianship of the Orthodox Faith during his life is an inspiration for us Orthodox Christians living in the West today. In our beloved temple of St Martin, in the heart of ancient Colchester, re-established as a place of Orthodox worship after so many centuries, we venerate this wonderful saint with joy and gratitude. We recall his deeds of mercy and compassion as we seek to grow our thanksgiving community, welcoming newcomers and strangers with love and hospitality and faithfully preserving and sharing our Orthodox Faith. Holy Father Martin, pray to God for us!
