Our bid for St Martin's progresses!

If you were not around here four years ago, for Holy Week 2008, you will not know how it felt to have our worship in St Martin's Church. West Stockwell Street. only 200 metres from St Helen's Chapel.

I tell you: it felt good (see picture)!

After all, St Martin's was originally an Orthodox church building - just as St Helen's was, and has been again since 2000.

Like St Helen's Chapel, St Martin's Church goes back beyond the Great Schism which divided East and West. It certainly goes back to Saxon times

(before 1066) for it still has some Saxon work at the west end.

According to the archaeologists, it probably goes back to the Romano-British period, the time of St Constantine and St Helen in the fourth century.

So we have put in a bid for St Martin's again. We have indeed got to a similar point on three or four occasions before. But this time it does look as though we have a good chance.

We hope so, though we must not count our chickens before they are hatched, as they say. When you come to Holy Week and Easter services this year how our worship and life pretty well fits in ideally.

St Martin's will provide us with more room for worshippers, and less disturbance when someone comes in late. It will give more 'sacred spots' for individuals to pray in, and room for confessions.

It will give us much better space for teaching displays, for books and holy objects to be sold, for other suitable activities, for somewhere to take children when they become noisy or fractious, for us to store the various items of worship.

There will be room in the North Aisle to have appropriate feasts and so on. In the South Aisle there will be room to place some lounge chairs for people to pop in and have a chat with other Orthodox Christians.



My hope is that the Parish will be able to develop other activities such as groups of different peoples - a Greek group, say, or a Romanian group. These will help immigrants to feel settled in Britain. Possibly there could be an advice centre.

There would also be space for meetings for non-Orthodox people who wish to learn more about our faith.

All this has been in our minds ever since we founded this Parish in 1995/6, and indeed before that

St Martin's was semiofficially offered to us as long ago as 1994 but unfortunately you will experience for yourself the offer did not come to fruition then. Nor since then has it become a reality ...

... Until now, when the offer has suddenly become much more real. Or so we hope and

At the time of writing we have nothing concrete to relate, but there is a meeting in London at the end of April which may make all things clear. Holy Week, and Easter this year will give us the chance of again worshipping in this beautiful building, so well suited to our purposes.

I pray it may prove to be the beginning of a love-affair of the Orthodox people for this ancient, beautiful, and basically Orthodox building.


English Orthodox Saint's 1000th anniversary

St Alphege was martyred at the hands of the Danes on 19 April 1012, a thousand years ago.

Born in 953 at Weston, just outside Bath, Alphege became a monk at Deerhurst, near Tewkesbury.

Wanting more seclusion, he returned to his boyhood home to live as a hermit on the hillside, but was called to be Abbot of Bath. Then he became Bishop of Winchester, and, in 1005, Archbishop of Canterbury.

At this time the Danes troubled England very much. They attacked Canterbury and took hostages including the Archbishop. Alphege refused to be ransomed.



They took him to Greenwich (now in south-east London), beat him and then beheaded him, on the site now occupied by the parish church.

This month there will be celebrations of the Martyr in various places, by Catholics and Anglicans and Orthodox, all of whom venerate him.

Christian values are very much under attack in our generation, not least in Britain, from atheists and half-believers. We must not be misled, but willing to stand up for the universal values that Christ and his Church have taught us.
