# Our future holiness is revealed in the events we celebrate in the season of Holy Pascha

here is a magnificent flow in the season of Pascha, which leads after forty days to the Ascension, and after fifty to Pentecost. Then there is in a sense a grand finale to the whole procession of feasts - All Saints Day.

**Ascension** marks the last day of Christ's being seen alive after his Resurrection. But it has a rich meaning in that it is understood as the day when returns to his Father in triumph, when he promises the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and the coming of the Kingdom, when he gives us the assurance that he will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead at the end of time, the eschatos, the last day of this world.

Pentecost follows swiftly, the fiftieth day. The power of God comes fully on the newborn Church, the world is turned upside down and inside out by the work of God.

In that Day of Pentecost (50th day) is revealed God as Three and God as One. The Third Person of the Holy Trinity has always been at work in the continuing work of Creation and more recently in the Person and Life of Christ. But the Holy Spirit has been unseen, hardly recognised until this point.

Now on Pentecost he is himself at last absolutely and wholly and clearly revealed. God shows us himself, One Holy God in Three Persons. We understand Pentecost not only as the feast of the Holy Spirit, but also as the feast of the Holy Trinity.

Depart St Helen's 10.30 am Molieben 12 noon Bring packed lunch. Sign the list in the Porch



### St Alban, First Martyr of Britain

My earliest childhood was at an Anglican church dedicated to St Alban in Harrow, north-west London, 15 miles from the site of where he was martyred in Roman times, between the early-3rd and early-4th century.

So I have had a life-long devotion to him. I well remember as a choir-boy being present, about 1948, when a statue to the Saint was dedicated in my church.

St Alban is called *Protomartyr of Britain*, the first to give his life for Christ in this land - though Greek tradition is that the Holy Apostle Simon Zelotes of the Twelve had also died here in the first century.

He was a Roman citizen and pagan when he gave shelter to a Christian priest during a persecution, but the priest's holiness and teaching converted him.

Soldiers came to arrest the priest, and Alban donned the priest's clothes to allow him to escape.

He was taken before the governor in the nearby Roman city of Verulamium, the ruins of which you can still visit. Condemned to death, he was taken across the river and up the hill to be beheaded. Miracles occurred on the way. In iconography he is often shown as a soldier - though probably not one, except in the sense of being a soldier for Christ.

The British honoured him as a Martyr, and centuries later the Saxons, not long converted to Christ, founded a holy monastery on the site of his martyrdom, in the city we call St Albans in Hertfordshire, just outside the M25 round London, and today you can see a magnificent mediaeval church where his relics were enshrined. The relics were tragically removed at the Reformation, but in recent years a relic was given (by a Catholic church in Germany), so again it is possible to venerate him there. Feast: 22 June.

### Here and There

THE FOURTH PILGRIMAGE TO BARKING was another very happy, fulfilling occasion. There were some 29 pilgrims, and we were greeted by the new Vicar of Barking, Bishop Trevor. MARGARET HAIG again organised the day, and brought a group by cable car and foot from the site of St Alphege's martyrdom in Greenwich. We started with a Molieben to the Saints and Sprinkling, and then picnicked in the hall. We visited the Holy Cross in its chapel, and had a talk (on the history of monasticism from the beginnings in Egypt past Barking in the mid-7th century). Vespers and Anointing concluded the proceedings, Tea rounded it all off. As usual, Fr ALEXANDER TEFFT and people from St Botolph's parish in London and All Saints in Basildon joined with us, and there were a few from other places. My disappointment was that only Khouria HILARY and I made it from Colchester.

## A Word from the Fathers: the Ascension of Christ our God

Today Jesus Christ our Lord went up to heaven: let our hearts go up with him.....
Just as he ascended without leaving us, so too we are already with him in heaven, although his promises have not yet been fulfilled in our bodies.

Christ is now raised above the heavens; but he still experiences on earth whatever sufferings we his members feel. He showed that this is true when he called out from heaven, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' and, 'I was thirsty and you gave me no drink,'

Why then do we not exert ourselves on earth so as to be happy with him already in heaven through the faith, hope, and charity which unite us with him?

Christ, while in heaven, is also with us, and we while on earth are also with him. He is with us in his godhead and his power and his love. And we - though we cannot be with him in godhead as he is with us - can be with him in our love, our love for him.

He did not leave heaven when he came down to us from heaven; and he did not leave us when he ascended to heaven again.

His own words show that he was in heaven while he was here: 'No one has ascended into heaven but he who descended from heaven, the Son of Man who is in heaven.'
