ROMAN GAVRILOV, an Orthodox Russian from Latvia, was living on the streets of Colchester in a sad way for several years. In the cold weather he slept in St Helen's. He died in March 2013, and I and Karen (who had generously taken him in, just a few months before the end of his life) attended the inquest, which has only just happened. The Coroner ruled that his death was an accident, the medical cause being alcohol poisoning due to chronic alcohol abuse. Roman was a sad man of course, but actually well-loved by a surprising number of people. A collection is being made to buy his grave in Colchester Cemetery, and then to erect a headstone. Memory eternal!

FR MICHAEL STOKES, the RC Parish Priest at Frinton, is a good friend of this Parish. He has always been very interested in Orthodoxy, being a member of the Fellowship of St Alban and St Sergius for many years.
