Who is Jesus? - His Baptism in the Jordan gives us the answer

Jesus of Nazareth enters the waters of the River Jordan. St John's Baptism was very much for repentance and forgiveness of sins, and John protests to Jesus, "You are the only one who is without sin: you should be baptising me, not I you."

But it all goes ahead. John testifies that as he baptises Jesus he hears a Voice from heaven saying, "This is my beloved Son," and he sees

a Dove alighting upon him.

How does this help us understand who and what Jesus of Nazareth is, who is obvious as a good man and great teacher?

- It shows that Jesus is the Christ, the Messiah, the one sent forth from heaven, anticipated by the ages.
- It avers that he a full human being but is sinless.
- It displays that he is the Second Person of the Holy Trinity, of God himself, that he is God incarnate.

The rest of the earthly life of Christ is just proof of that belief. His teaching, his miracles, his death and resurrection, are just proofs of that divinity displayed at the River.

Of course, it is only proof for those who believe in him, for Christians. Others may dismiss him as a fool or as a charlatan.

But for those who believe, it is the power of God for salvation.

So as a believer I must learn to place my whole trust in him, to listen to his teaching, to trust in his mercy, to celebrate his holy death and glorious resurrection, and to experience the power of this God-Man in my everyday life.

An Orthodox Study Weekend in beautiful Edinburgh

Accommodation at a guest house is available @ £25 per person per night, but you need to book quickly.

A Word from the Fathers: St Peter Chrysologus, Abp of Ravenna (+450)

oday Christ entered the riverbed of the Jordan, to wash away the world's sin: John himself bears witness that he came for this: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world."

Today the servant holds the Lord, man holds God, John holds Christ: holds him, as about to receive, not to grant forgiveness.

Today, as the Prophet says: "The Lord's voice" is "on the waters." What voice? "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased.

Today the Holy Spirit floats over the waters in the form of a dove, so that by this sign it might be known that the world's universal shipwreck has ceased, as the dove had announced to Noah that the world's flood had subsided.

Nor does this dove carry a branch of the old olive, but it pours the whole richness of the olive on the head of the Author of the new anointing, in order to fulfil what the prophet foretold: "Therefore God, your God, has anointed you with the oil of gladness above other kings."



St Anthony the Great

is "the Father of Monks" in that though he was not the very first to live the monastic way, he showed how this ascetic way could be lived both by doing it himself, and by organising the life of the huge number of those who followed him into the desert of Egypt. He thereby influenced all subsequent monastic leaders, both eastern and western. The Monastic Way is of course extremely important in Orthodoxy, and his influence is with us to this day. He died in AD 356, aged 105 years.
