Order in the Church....

ny and every organisation must surely have its rules (written or unwritten) for what it considers right thinking and good behaviour. So does Holy Church, which maintains her beliefs and way of life down through the ages.

The very word Orthodoxy means right belief or right worship. It is entirely necessary to ensure that the Bishops and clergy teach and practise the true faith, which - right from the beginning of the Church's life - has saved both our predecessors in the Faith and

ourselves for eternal life.

In the East there has been more emphasis on the need to keep the true Faith. In the West more on the need to hold on to a unity in organisation. Thus its emphasis on the place of the Pope of Rome and on his being the centre of its unity.

Of course both East and West really ask for both, while having differences on what is actually the true Faith.

In the West a further challenge to the understanding of Christianity grew in the sixteenth and succeeding centuries. The Protestants separated, mostly claiming that full truth could be found in the Holy Scriptures, and every individual seemingly having the right to decide what the Scriptures meant. This rather inadequate position has resulted in the hundreds of Protestant denominations there are today.

The Orthodox view of order and authority is different.

Here no one individual, Pope or Patriarch, has ultimate authority over the Church. Nor do the Holy Scriptures, nor do the Fathers of the Church.

No, ultimate authority in the Orthodox Church is the living Spirit of God indwelling the

Church, expressing its mind in the life of the Church taken as a whole.

It is the Councils of the Church which decide what is the truth



the Church believes and trusts in. The first Ecumenical Council was in AD 325, the last in AD 787, which we celebrate this month, on 14 October.

Their decisions may be said to be ratified by the continuing adherence to them of the whole Orthodox community (Bishops, Priests, and laity) over the centuries.

So for us Christ himself is The Authority over the Church, through his Holy Spirit.

That is why splits on matters of teaching are so uncommon over the years of the Orthodox Church's life.

We certainly sadly disagree over matters of everyday life - the sad split over Qatar between our own Patriarch and the Patriarch of Jerusalem, ongoing for several years now, is an example. Now we also have a split between Constantinople and Moscow over Ukraine.

It's sad, since all Orthodox certainly agree on the Faith.

ST OSYTH is a local saint. Her husband Sighere was king of Essex: he became a Christian, but apostatised. She then founded a holy monastery at the village of Chich, near Clacton, now called after her. A pious Queen (bearing a pious son who became St Offa King of Essex), she became a devoted nun, but was martyred by a raiding band of Danes about the year AD 700. Today there remain a fine mediaeval

gatehouse and bits of the late monastic buildings in the mansion house, but the site of the monastery of her day is the lovely parish church across the road. Her feast-day is 7 October.

A Word from the Fathers on Icons

cons... are to be kept in churches and honoured with the same relative veneration as is shown to other material symbols, such as the 'precious and life-giving Cross' and the Book of the Gospels.

Fathers of the Seventh Council, AD 787, commemorated 14 October

Concerning the charge of idolatry: Icons are not idols but symbols, therefore when an Orthodox venerates an icon, he is not guilty of idolatry. He is not worshipping the symbol, but merely venerating it. Such veneration is not directed toward wood, or paint or stone, but towards the person depicted. Therefore relative honour is shown to material objects, but worship is due to God alone...

We do not make obeisance to the nature of wood, but we revere and do obeisance to Him who was crucified on the Cross...

When the two beams of the Cross are joined together I adore the figure because of Christ who was crucified on the Cross, but if the beams are separated, I throw them away and burn them.
