St Martin's: Good news: **Listed Building Consent granted!**



Listed Building Consent has just been granted for our plans for St Martin's. Praise to God!

This means, if I understand it correctly, that the Church Commissioners will now proceed with their advertising of our intended purchase. Unfortunately that cannot be done until lockdown is lifted, including a day for them to open St Martin's for people to inspect it.

If no objection is then raised by the public, they will continue with making arrangements to hand over the building.

Of course, as we have said before, while we will be freehold owners, we will continue to need approval of individual items of work. as with any listed building. This we can only accept as the price of having a special building like St Martin's, which is Listed Grade 2*.

Similar rules would be cover altering your house - to a greater or lesser degree - especially if it is listed.

Congratulations to Project Manager Mark and the whole Project Committee.

The Appeal Total continues to rise, though of course slowly, for the moment, since we are waiting for the right moment to "push" it again. Recently we passed the £160,000 marker, and we are most grateful to all who have contributed.

Here and There

ST SOPHRONY: Our really local Saint, from our own day, is going to remain an important figure in the life of this community. He founded the

Holy Monastery of St John the Baptist, only ten miles or so away from us, and we know that he visited St Martin's Churchand very likely at least the outside of St Helen's Chapel. Very newly glorified—only late last year—he was well-known to Orthodox people in this area and throughtout the world, and to local non-Orthodox people too, for that matter. He died in 1993. We have now been generously presented with an icon of him by Sister Gabriela. At the moment the icon is in our house, but soon will move to St Helen's for a while, and then in due course to St Martin's. We are very grateful to the iconographer and the community for this gracious gift.

MY HEALTH: Thank you for your interest and help and prayers. The doctors and nurses seem to be pretty pleased with my progress, which continues.

FEASTS AND FASTS: We have published this monthly list since very early on in the history of the Parish, produced from the St Helen's Calendar for computers. But latterly most parishioners do not seem to have found it useful and very few have been taking copies (though we do know that certain folk have indeed used it). It has taken some effort each month, usually in a hurry. I have therefore decided, with a certain amount of regret, to cease production with immediate effect. FASTING RULES: Please note that the Holy Synod of Antioch follows the ancient rule that we do not fast at all during Paschal-tide, not on any Wednesdays or Fridays in the season. We start fasting again on the day before Holy Ascension, this year 27 May.

St Constantine and St Helen

These two great Saints are of course mother and son, normally commemorated together in the Orthodox Church. But in the West, the son is not generally venerated as a Saint, so that churches in Britain will be normally dedicated to Helen on her own. In Colchester you will find that she is referred to as St Helen or Helena, but he only as Constantine the Great, though both in ancient days were honoured as natives of this city. Their joint feast in Orthodoxy is the date of his repose in the Lord, 21 May, but in the West St Helen is traditionally kept on 18 August, the date of her repose. Because of our world's present troubles,

we are sadly unlikely to be able to observe 21 May this year as our Parish Feast. But,
