

Theophany: God revealed to us

The feast of the Holy Theophany is one of the greatest feasts of the Orthodox year. It commemorates not only the outward Baptism of Christ. It also displays the inner meaning of the coming of Christ, sent by the Heavenly Father into this world. Theophany indeed means exactly the *revealing*, *unveiling* of God.

It is the first showing of the truth that Christ, the Man who was baptised in the Jordan, is in fact God.

Christ is shown to be True God, one of the Persons of the Holy Trinity: Christ standing in the water, the Voice of the Father heard, the likeness of the dove alighting on him as the Holy Spirit.

But it is just as important to understand that in going down to the River Jordan to be baptised by his cousin John the Forerunner, Christ is also displaying his Manhood, he is showing that he has taken on *sinful* Manhood.

Christ is in fact *sinless*, but identifies himself with us as *sinners*. If he had not done it, his coming into the world would have been useless, he would not have identified absolutely with us as sinful men. He would have identified himself only with a *sinless* humanity which does not really exist.

Now he identifies himself with us who are—all, each one of us—sinners, but who also have all the possibilities of being brought back from evil, from the sins of body and soul, from the corruption in which we are bound. We have the possibilities of redemption, allowing us the hope of heaven, the joy of the Saints.

And Christ coming to the Jordan shows us all this.

hat a transformation we now see is possible for us! What a transfiguration is possible! What a change in our state!

The One who comes to the River and accepts Baptism from one, John, who is lesser than he, shows his humility. When Christ comes as God-among-Men he does not come in state and glory but in weakness, the weakness he shows on the Holy Cross.

That is the sort of God we worship, not one with a whip or as an executioner. To those who recognise him, Jesus Christ, as true God and true Man, he comes as Giver of life-giving water to my life, of eternal life. He comes as my Lord and my Saviour.

Every Mayor of Colchester for the last 20 years has been to our Shrine Chapel on taking office, to pay respects to St Helen and her relic, and to the tradition that she was born here and built this temple as her place of worship. This year the new leader of our Borough is Councillor Robert Davidson and though taking office rather late he will in fact serve for some 18 months, as his predecessor has done. It has always been a low-key occasion—a little talk about the traditions of S Helen, a short, rather private, Orthodox service of prayer, and a little chat about this and that, including this time the unsurprising discovery that he, being a farmer, knows a number of my relatives who farm in this area and shares Scottish origins.
